
Crafting Madness: Franken-Animals

Why Math and Statistics are Critical Tools In Global Public Health

What was so compelling about John Snow's conclusion that cholera was spread through contaminated water?

Eben Kenah is a Granville High School alum and holds an ScD in Epidemiology and an MS in Biostatistics from the Harvard School of Public Health. He is an associate professor of biostatistics in the College of Public Health at The Ohio State University, where he develops statistical methods for infectious disease epidemiology.
